

**Grants Alert Information  
forwarded by the Florida Developmental Disabilities Council**

The four grants reviewed in this Alert are from two Federal agencies.

A total of approximately \$8,737,000 (\$8.737 million) in public funds will be made available in up to 36 awards, ranging from \$100,000 to \$450,000 per award.

Funds will be utilized to:

- 1) Improve results for children with disabilities through the creation of Community Parent Resource Centers, that will provide parents of these children with reliable and effective training and information;
- 2) Improve results for children with disabilities through the creation of Parent Training and Information Centers, that will provide parents of these children with effective and reliable information and training;
- 3) Increase knowledge about how to care for the acutely injured; and
- 4) Increase knowledge about how to prevent unintentional injuries.

These programs are offered through the Department of Education (Office of Special Education & Rehabilitative Services) and the Department of Health and Human Services (Center for Disease Control and Prevention).

Letter of Intent Deadline: January 3, 2006.

Application Deadline: February 3, 2006.

Purpose: To expand and advance the understanding of the care of the acutely injured.

Applications must address one of these research objectives:

- A. Evaluate strategies to translate, disseminate, implement, and adopt science-based recommendations and guidelines for the care of the acutely injured.
- B. Develop and evaluate acute injury treatment strategies that will result in defining evidence-based management protocols for persons who sustain life-threatening injuries, injuries that could lead to significant disability, or both.
- C. Determine and evaluate the components of trauma systems that contribute to improved outcomes for the acutely injured.
- D. Determine and evaluate how acute injury care is affected by mass casualty and disaster situations.
- E. Develop and evaluate protocols that provide on-site interventions in acute care settings or linkages to off-site services for patients at risk of injury or psychosocial problems following injury.
- F. Develop and evaluate interventions for the individual, sociocultural, and community consequences of acute injury.
- G. Identify and evaluate new or existing health measures to better assess both short-term and long-term outcomes for persons treated in a prehospital and hospital acute injury care setting.

Eligible Applicants: Public and private non-profit and for-profit organizations; small, minority, or women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized Indian tribal governments; Indian tribes; Indian tribal organizations; State, Territory, and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents; and political subdivisions of States (in consultation with States).

Estimated Available Funds: Approximately \$1,800,000.

Maximum Award Amount: \$450,000 per year.

Estimated Number of Awards: 3 to 5.

Project Period: Up to three years.

Injuries

Letter of Intent Deadline: January 3, 2006.

Application Deadline: February 3, 2006.

Purpose: To expand and advance the understanding of the steps taken to prevent unintentional injuries, and how these steps can best be translated for maximum impact in public health.

Applications must address one of these research objectives:

1. Dissemination Research -- to learn how to encourage practitioners and policy makers to adopt science-based programs, policies, laws, and regulations in order to reduce unintentional injuries. Investigators are encouraged to conduct studies to build knowledge on methods, structures, and processes to implement existing evidence-based interventions, programs and policies to prevent unintentional injury related to the home and community, sports and exercise and motor vehicle travel.

2. Intervention Evaluation Research

a) Evaluate the efficacy, effectiveness and/or cost effectiveness of behavioral, environmental, legislative or regulatory interventions to prevent unintentional injuries, especially those related to pedestrian injuries, adolescent motor vehicle-related injuries, and injuries related to sports, exercise, and recreation (including drowning). These interventions can be targeted universally or at selected or high-risk populations to influence injury risk behaviors or (preferably) injury outcomes.

b) Develop and test theory-based interventions of parental supervision strategies to reduce unintentional injury among children.

Eligible Applicants: Public and private non-profit and for-profit organizations; small, minority, or women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized Indian tribal governments; Indian tribes; Indian tribal organizations; State, Territory, and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents; and political subdivisions of States (in consultation with States).

Estimated Available Funds: Approximately \$750,000.

Maximum Award Amount: \$250,000 per year.

Estimated Number of Awards: 2 to 3.

Project Period: Up to three years.
